It has been two months since the devastating earthquake in Haiti. This past month AAUW-MA Board voted to donate \$100.00 to CARE in support of the relief work in Haiti. We realize this is just a drop in the bucket but every little bit helps. On March 6th, a very dear friend of AAUW Taunton hosted a fundraising event at Rhode Island College to assist in the rebuilding of Haiti – one woman at a time. The event was co-sponsored by AAUW-MA. We have so many exciting and important events and programs in MA that promote and support equity for women. As you know, a year ago President Obama signed the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act. However this did not go far enough to ensure pay equity in the workplace. We need passage of the Paycheck Fairness Act. This is what is posted on the AAUW website in this regard: "On Tuesday, March 11, the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions will hold a hearing on the **Paycheck Fairness Act (S.182)**. As AAUW members are quite aware, the Paycheck Fairness Act is a much needed updated of the 46-year-old Equal Pay Act. This comprehensive bill – which now has 37 Senate cosponsors – would create stronger incentives for employers to follow the law, empower women to negotiate for equal pay, and strengthen federal outreach, education and enforcement efforts. The bill would also deter wage discrimination by strengthening penalties for equal pay violations and by prohibiting retaliation against workers who ask about employers' wage practices or disclose their own wages. In short, the bill updates the law to reflect the practices and processes under more recent civil rights laws. Following the enactment of the **Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act** last year, passing the Paycheck Fairness Act is a logical next step forward in the fight for pay equity."

Don't forget April 20th is Pay Equity Day!! Because equity is STILL an ISSUE!!

I also hope to see you all on April 10, 2010 at our State Convention.

Superlative Sisters

Alison Lima

MCSW Names Alison Lima Unsung Heroine - 2009

Alison Lima graduated as Class Valedictorian of Taunton High School's class of 2001. Born and raised in Taunton, one of two daughters of Thomas and Joan (Castro) Lima, she is extremely proud of her Cape Verdean and Portuguese ancestry. As granddaughter of immigrants from both the Republic of Cape Verde on her father's side and Portugal on her mother's side, she was raised with good values as well as a keen sense of community and volunteerism. Her incredible journey has taken her from Taunton to Iowa and abroad. She earned a B.S. in Biology and International Studies with a minor in Spanish and Anthropology from Iowa State University. Alison founded and coordinated the Tsunami Relief Project at Iowa State, raising \$6,000 for the American Red Cross tsunami fund. She has studied abroad conducting medical and health care research in five foreign nations including Belize, Chile, Georgia, Mexico and Nicaragua.

Alison returned to the U.S. in 2008 after serving 2 years in the Peace Corps as a Community Health Educator in Nicaragua, Central America. She was placed as a health volunteer and worked at the government's Madriz health administration building called SILAIS. There she principally worked with a team of educators and nurses on a sexual and reproductive health project for adolescents living in 6 of the 9 counties of Madriz. Along with conducting health fairs, workshops and charlas, her peace Corps experience led her to coordinate extensively with what is called social communication...mass media like television and radio, to promote healthy behaviors. As a side project she helped organize a radionovela – radio soap opera - which will promote changes in attitudes and behaviors related to sexual and reproductive health in adult and youth populations. On one of Alison's "vacations" home to the Silver City she worked very hard to raise money for two additional projects: she purchased books to help teach the youth to read and bats, balls gloves and basic uniforms to outfit the new woman's softball team she was organizing back at her second home in Somoto, where she noted that women's sports are "practically" non-existent. She also met her new husband, Donald Espinoza Valenzuela, while she was in Nicaragua.

Alison worked at the Center for Community Health Education, Research and Service (CCHERS) at Northeastern University in 2009, where she managed the Community Voices program for high school students of color interested in health careers. She is now enrolled as a first year medical student at UMass Medical School, Worcester. In her *spare time* Alison's hobbies include dancing, crocheting and spending time with her husband

and family. She is also one of the youngest members of the Taunton Area Branch of AAUW.

Alison's Personal Essay for application to Medical School says it best...*My goal was based on a natural curiosity and love for science and that unstoppable drive my grandparents had instilled in our family. And after my first medical experience shadowing a cardiovascular surgeon in the UMass High School Health Careers Program, I was sure that medicine was for me.*

In college, I concentrated on preparing myself to be a doctor by coupling my love of science with a unique interest in understanding and helping humanity. My families' immigrant past kept me sensitive to and curious about how people live around the globe and the diversity that exists within our own country. I took courses in Spanish, Anthropology, History, Politics, and International, African-American, and Latino studies to complement my biology major and broaden my understanding of people and the places they live. I also helped start several organizations like the Student International Medical Aid Club and the Tsunami Relief Project which helped others around the world and simultaneously taught me and my fellow classmates about the importance of service. I diversified my education because I knew that being a good doctor meant more than being good at science, it required having a perspective that allows for compassion, cultural competence, and understanding.

Rochelle Lima-Babigian

Rochelle Lima-Babigian graduated Salutatorian, Taunton High School, Class of 1998 and Magna Cum Laude from Boston University in 2002 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Human Physiology. During her years at B.U. she volunteered at Boston Medical Center – one year on the Pediatric Floor and one year in the Emergency Room where she served as a liaison between patients' families and the medical staff and was compelled to change her field from Surgeon to Emergency Room doctor.

Rochelle enrolled in New York University's School of Medicine where she earned her M.D. in 2007. She is currently an Emergency Room Doctor in her third year at Boston Medical Center, paving the way for her sister Alison who is in her first year of medical school. In Rochelle's words:

"I could have gone into another field of medicine and made more money. It's not about the money...medical care is a right not a privilege. I feel very blessed and lucky to be in the position that I am...to be given the chance to give back to the minority populations and underserved in some meaningful way. Ali has told me that I was a role model to her. I hope to be a role model to many others who otherwise would have none."

Nera-Lee Patel is a resident of North Attleboro, MA. She graduated from North Attleboro High School in 2003 and graduated with a degree in biomedical engineering and minor entrepreneurship and management from Johns Hopkins University. At Raytheon, Nera-Lee enjoys her technical work, but also serves as the president for a 900 member organization for young employees.

Outside of Raytheon, Nera-Lee has co-founded a program called LAUNCH, which brings together her interests in science, technology, engineering, math and business. Nera-Lee believes that it is important to encourage women in the sciences and in business. As a result, LAUNCH has the goal of bringing in an audience that is at least 50% women. In the fall of 2010, she will begin her studies as an MBA student at Babson College.

Liz Calef

Liz Calef is a physics teacher and lead coach for the award-winning Robotics team, TJ², at Bridgewater-Raynham High School. In 1996, Liz heard about FIRST and, with the extraordinary support of the partnership with Johnson & Johnson

companies, TJ² was born. FIRST (*For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology*) was founded in 1989 to inspire young people's interest and participation in science and technology. Based in Manchester, NH, this not-for-profit public charity designs accessible, innovative programs that motivate young people to pursue education and career opportunities in science, technology, engineering, and math, while building self-confidence, knowledge, and life skills. The mission of FIRST is to inspire young people to be science and technology leaders, by engaging them in exciting mentor-based programs that build science, engineering and technology skills, that inspire innovation, and that foster well-rounded life capabilities including self-confidence, communication, and leadership. FIRST Robotics Competition (FRC) is a unique varsity sport of the mind designed to help high-school-aged young people discover how interesting and rewarding the life of engineers and researchers can be. 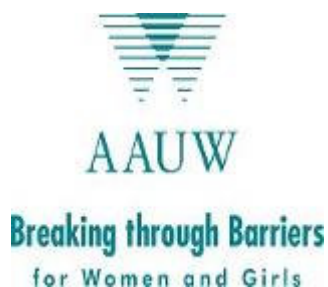
The Massasoit Community College AAUW CAP team's project meets a specific need on their campus. Every spring, the college accepts only 160 students out of approximately 1,000 applicants to its nursing and allied health programs. Hundreds of students—mostly female, and many of whom have taken science and math courses in preparation for studying nursing, radiological technology, or respiratory therapy—feel they have no career alternative. To address this problem, the Massasoit team will increase awareness among these students of alternative science, technology, engineering, and mathematics careers by preparing informative bulletin boards and holding a STEM career day and panel discussion of women employed in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics careers.

AMPLIFY!, a fundraiser to support Teen Voices, will take place on Wednesday, April 14, 2010 at Simmons College.



For more than 20 years, Teen Voices has empowered girls and young women to create positive social change. **Teen Voices** is a local initiative with international impact. Through innovative journalism, mentoring and leadership programs in Boston, primarily low-income girls of color learn essential writing, editing, research, critical thinking, and leadership skills crucial for success.

Member Spotlight—Enid Wilson

Legal Advocacy Fund

The AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF) works to combat sex discrimination in higher education and the workplace. LAF seeks *amicus curiae* opportunities in workplace sex discrimination cases. LAF also provides support to workplace sex discrimination cases that have the potential to make a difference for all women. LAF is actively reviewing new case support applications. If you would like to make a case recommendation, please contact laf@aauw.org. Recommendation forms are accepted on a rolling basis.

The LAF Committee met in early February to discuss case support. After careful review, they decided to hold off on supporting two new strategic case recommendations until further activity occurs with each case. They then decided, and the full board voted, to disburse \$5,000 to each of the five continuing LAF-supported cases.

Many of you will remember Arezou Mansourian, a LAF

litigant who spoke to us at the 2006 Spring convention at Salem State. On February 8, the 9th Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals sided with the LAF-supported plaintiffs in ***Mansourian, et al. v. Regents of the University of California, et al.*** on several fronts, overturning a lower court judge's 2008 opinion. Mansourian's lawyer Kristen Galles said, "Thanks again to AAUW for its support. We used your money to pay for the very expensive court transcript and exhibits and travel for the oral argument. Attorneys donated their time for free, but it is very difficult for public interest attorneys to pay such huge court costs out of pocket, so AAUW support can mean the difference between a victory and no case at all."

National Girls and Women in Sports Day AAUW partnered with the Washington Mystics to celebrate their third annual National Girls and Women in Sports Day at the University of Maryland, College Park. More than 200 people attended the event, which was followed by a University of Maryland women's basketball game against Duke University. AAUW staff distributed information about the Title IX Compliance: Know the Score Program in a Box and AAUW membership to attendees.

Dues News

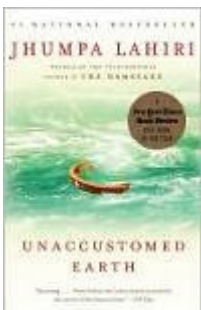

It will soon be time to renew your membership in AAUW. The National dues and the Massachusetts state dues will remain the same for 2010-2011. National dues continue to be \$49 and Massachusetts state dues will once again be \$15. If you are the member of a branch your local branch dues will be added to these two amounts. Life members only need to pay state and branch dues. Any member may become a paid life member of the Association upon payment of the current Association dues multiplied by 20 (\$980). Paid life members are exempt from further payment of Association dues although they continue to pay state and branch dues.

Any member who has paid Association dues for 50 years is eligible for Honorary Life Membership and thereafter shall be exempt from payment of Association dues. The 50 years need not be consecutive and this would happen any time after payment of Association dues for the 50th membership year. In order to achieve this status the member or the member's branch must submit the application available on the AAUW website. Honorary life branch members will receive a congratulatory letter, certificate and permanent membership card. Honorary Life members will continue to pay state dues. Applications are available from Connect2AAUW (connect@aauw.org) or in the Member Center under Forms.

Cape Cod Branch Diversity Reading Program

Cape Cod continues to read a "diversity" book as initiated by Nancy Moore three years ago. As you may recall, we started with *The Bonecutter's Daughter* at that time.

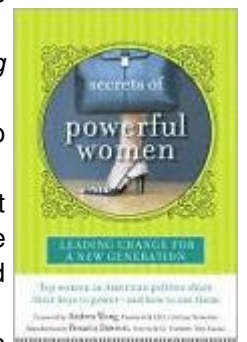
