I never really

applied it to myself or to AAUW-MA as a viable and vital organization. Now, I have a different view.

Stepping into the role of president of AAUW-MA meant I had to break through a barrier of my own. I've always been a good team player and a diligent worker bee. I could handle the middle management role, but never considered being the "leader" of anything. Making the decision to "go for it" was a complete leap of faith. I had to let go of the idea that there was someone more capable than I, and there well may be, and that I did not "have what it takes", whatever that is, to take on this significant responsibility. So, having broken through that barrier of my own, I realize we all have these barriers and we need to find ways to break through them.

AAUW, as a national organization, has and still is, working on breaking through its own barriers. Open membership and one member, one vote, are examples of changes which involve breaking barriers. Similarly, AAUW-MA needs to break through some barriers of its own.

The future of our organization, nationally and locally, is in the hands of younger women. If we do not bring young members into our fold, we cannot be a viable organization. The logical step is to reach out to and engage college women and men. AAUW was founded by college graduates who wanted to ease the way for other women to attain a college degree. As I heard of Jan's program in Saudi Arabia teaching young women social entrepreneurship, I thought: this is something our AAUW-MA members need to hear about and we need to connect with Babson and the terrific work they are doing. That's how our conference: *Education, Employment, Empowerment: The Global Prospects for Women*, began.

AAUW-MA is breaking through a barrier of its own. We are collaborating with the Center for Women's Leadership, and isn't that where we should be, to create a dynamic, interactive conference that will engage women from universities, corporations, non-profits, and volunteer organizations. Thanks to our partnership with Babson, their state-of- the- art facility, the Executive Conference Center, is a perfect venue. Breaking through barriers involves risk and we are taking one. The AAUW discounted \$85 fee for registration and the \$45 student fee for will require strong sponsorship support. Non-AAUW attendees will pay the real cost \$105 registration fee. 

AAUW Director of Public Policy and Government Relations

As AAUW's top policy adviser, Lisa Maatz works to advance AAUW's priority issues on Capitol Hill, through the executive branch, and in coalition with other organizations. Maatz has done similar work for the NOW Legal Defense and Education Fund and the Older Women's League, and was a

legislative aide to U.S. Congresswoman Carolyn Maloney (D-NY). Her grassroots advocacy career began when she was the Executive Director of Turning Point, a battered women's program recognized for excellence by the Ohio Supreme Court. Maatz's areas of expertise include gender equity in education, Title IX, retirement security, pay equity, and other civil rights issues related to women and girls.

Maatz is a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Ohio University, has two Master's degrees from Ohio State, and holds an adjunct appointment with the Women and Politics Institute at American University.

Directions to the Babson College Campus From the east:Take the Massachusetts Turnpike to Exit 15 (Interstate 95/Route 128). After the tolls, follow signs to Route 95/128 South to Exit 21 (Route 16 Newton/Wellesley) ... From the west:Take the Massachusetts Turnpike to Exit 14 (Interstate 95/Route 128). After the tolls, follow signs to Route 95/128 South to Exit 21 (Route 16 Newton/Wellesley) ... From the south:Follow Route 95/128 North to Exit 21 (Route 16 Newton/Wellesley) ... empowerment in her leadership at Goldman Sachs, as well as her pioneering work as the founding director of Forte Foundation.

Goldman Sachs is, of course, also well known and highly regarded for their recent initiatives, 10,000 Women, 10,000 Small Businesses.

Edie's responsibilities include global recruiting, training and diversity. Head of Fixed Income, Currency and

Commodities Human Capital Management from 1999-2001, she was named managing director in 1999 and became a partner in 2004. Ms. Hunt is now a senior managing partner at Goldman Sachs.

Ms. Hunt received her BA and BS degrees from the University of Pennsylvania in 1972. She is the first woman to receive dual degrees from UP and the Wharton School. She received her MBA in 1974 from the University of

Chicago. She is a member of Howard University School of Business Board of Visitors, the Trustees' Council of Penn Women, and the Forte Foundation's Board of Directors. Edie has devoted much of her career to bringing women and particularly women of multicultural backgrounds into the corporate world. The Forte Foundation, established in 2001, was founded to address the inequities of women in MBA programs and in the business world in general. Women still comprise less than 16% of the corporate officers in America's 500 largest companies.

"We are challenged to develop new, timely and relevant diversity content that directly impacts our people's commercial agility, career development and workplace experience. We are aggressively leveraging technology to deliver a robust online diversity and inclusion curriculum. E-learning courses focus on topics such as cross-cultural competencies, generational differences and religion in the workplace. These online courses give our people the flexibility to engage in diversity training outside of the traditional classroom setting. We also host the Multicultural Women's Loft Series, small-group discussions led by senior leaders from around the firm. Being diverse is not optional; it is what we must be."

AAUW International Fellows

Each year, AAUW funding makes a difference in lives of over three dozen remarkable women from around the world through the AAUW International Fellowships. International Fellowships are awarded for full-time study or research to women who are not U.S. citizens or permanent residents, and wish to pursue graduate or postgraduate studies at accredited educational institutions in the U.S. and other countries.

Recipients of the International Fellowships are selected according to their academic achievements and proven commitment to women and girls. Upon return to their home countries, the AAUW International Fellows are well equipped to become leaders in government, academia, community activism, arts, and science.

The International Fellowships program, originally designed to provide Latin American women with opportunities for graduate and postgraduate studies in the U.S., awarded its first fellowship in 1917. In 1945, AAUW expanded the program to provide higher education opportunities to European women from countries devastated during World War II. The program now includes women from around the world. So far, International Fellowships have been awarded to over 3,000 women from 135 countries.

Forty-one remarkable women from 20 different countries, sponsored by the AAUW International Fellowship grants during this academic year, will pursue their professional development in 18 U.S. states as well as in the U.K. and Holland. Five of the Fellows came to Massachusetts to pursue their studies at Harvard, Brandeis University, and University of Massachusetts in Amherst.



Shraddha Barahi (Nepal) is studying international development at Harvard. Her interests include expanding the role of private sector and developing programs for youth entrepreneurship.

Rutendo Kashambwa (Zimbabwe) while at the Harvard School of Public Health is going to analyze epidemiological factors relevant to HIV/ AIDS incidence among pregnant women in Zimbabwe. She intends to develop educational programs aimed at early detection and prevention.





Martha Nyongani (Malawi) is studying

educational policy issues at the University of Massachusetts in Amherst. She is interested in exploring social marketing as an alternative strategy for planning school food programs in Malawi.

Judy Bolanle Ogunyemi (Kenya) while at Brandeis University is researching feasibility of various interventions regarding sexual and reproductive rights issues in Kenya.

Komolakhon Rakhmanova

(Uzbekistan) is studying social science at Brandeis University. Her research focus is in sustainable international development, the role of community health systems, and alleviation of poverty.
