

Breaking Through Barriers for Women and Girls

PROGRAM: FACING CHOICES AND CHALLENGES: WOMEN WORKING IN S.T.E.M. FIELDS JANUARY 6, 11:30 AM BEDFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY

A panel of three women in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) fields at the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' headquarters in Concord, MA will discuss their varied experiences which brought them to where they are now.

- Janet Patev—Geotechnical engineer in the Planning and Engineering Division
- Jennifer McCarthy—Wetland biologist and Chief of the Regulatory Division
- Irene Watts—Coastal engineer in the Planning and Engineering Division

The panel will be moderated by branch member, Ruth Ladd, herself a wetland biologist.

Janet is originally from Colorado, the daughter of an electrical engineer. Because of his influence, she decided to pursue an engineering degree instead of a straight science degree in college. Because of her interest in geology, she attended the Colorado School of Mines, and earned a B.S. in Geological Engineering. She was in ROTC during college and was commissioned a second lieutenant in the US Army upon graduation. She spent four years as an Engineer Officer, stationed mainly at Fort Rucker, Alabama. Upon separation from the Army, she went to Nashville, TN to work as an environmental engineer for a consulting engineering firm. While in Nashville, she learned about the Department of the Army Intern program with the Corps of Engineers, and was hired in 1991 as a DA Intern. She spent two years in Nashville with the Corps, and then moved to Fort Worth,

Texas where she was able to work with the Corps office there as a geotechnical engineer. In 2000 she moved to New Hampshire and didn't work at all, choosing instead to stay at home with her two boys, then aged 3 and 6. In 2007 she came back to work for the Corps, this time with their Concord, MA office where she currently works as a geotechnical engineer specializing in dams.

Jennifer McCarthy has served as the Regulatory Division Chief for the New England District Corps of Engineers since April 2009. Prior to that, she was a Regulatory Program Manager at Corps headquarters in D.C. She previously worked at two Corps Districts, in St. Paul, MN and Norfolk, VA, as a Regulatory project manager and enforcement coordinator. She also

Upon her return to Sri Lanka, she hopes to contribute to community reconciliation efforts, while teaching full time at a Sri Lankan university.

worked for the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service as the national wetland conservation program manager, as an environmental consultant, and as a wetlands and stormwater specialist for a non-profit organization. She is a Professional Wetland Scientist and has a BS degree in Marine Science from the University of South Carolina and a MS in Biology/Wetland Ecology from Old Dominion University.

Irene attended URI for a BS in Ocean Engineering and minor in Geology. She worked for a consulting firm in Annapolis, MD, performing habitat restoration, disposal of contaminated sediments and cap design. She then attended Oregon State University for a Masters of Civil Engineering (coastal) which focused on ocean instrumentation in support of wave energy research. She joined the Army Corps of Engineers New England District in December 2008 as a Coastal Engineer. Irene grew up in Webster, NY. Her interests not related to engineering include sailing, scuba diving and dancing.

Ruth graduated from Connecticut College with a B.A. in Zoology. Her route to the Corps was meandering via the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, mothering of four children, a variety of 'tweener jobs including job-sharing of a couple technical word processing positions, returning to environmental work as a consultant (at which point she started on her M.S. in Environmental Science at UMass-Lowell), and finally joining the Corps in 1991. She is now in the Regulatory Division.

This is a great program to share with young women who work in the area (they can come over their lunchtime—which is what Janet, Jennifer, Irene, and Ruth will be doing) or those home from college for the winter break. It is an opportunity for networking with women from varied backgrounds who have made careers in fields where women are still in the minority, in spite of years of efforts by groups such as AAUW.


By all accounts we had a successful evening for EF on December 2nd. Our guest fellows did not disappoint.

Rachael Amos, recipient of our branch support for a math enrichment program.


