STATE CONFERENCE

On Saturday, November 6, 2010 Babson's Center for Women's Leadership and AAUW-- Massachusetts will be co-hosting an important conference: "Education, Employment, Empowerment: The Global Prospects for Women".

Throughout the day, outstanding moderators and panelists will lead us in exploring the challenges and opportunities for women and girls as they pursue learning, join the workforce and add their voices to the critical discussions and decisions affecting their lives. The three concurrent morning sessions will look at these issues through a global lens, while the afternoon sessions will examine what's happening in the U.S., broadly and, more specifically in Massachusetts. The framework for both morning and afternoon sessions will be women's entrepreneurial thinking and acting, how corporations are encouraging and supporting women's education, employment and empowerment and examples of notfor-profit and advocacy initiatives that are making a difference. We will end the day with a session that not only encourages but enables participants to make real commitments to action.

The Conference (which will be held at Babson's Executive Conference Center) will begin with registration from 7:30 -- 8:15 a.m., the Welcome at 8:30, followed by the keynote speaker from 9:00 - 10:00 a.m.

The entire day has been created to ensure that everyone ---presenters and participants---have multiple opportunities to learn more about the issues and about the programs and perspectives that are having an impact. It has also been carefully designed to give everyone multiple opportunities to make real, meaningful connections and, most importantly, to begin acting to make a difference.



DID YOU KNOW THAT...

...On August 26, Wal-Mart requested that the Supreme Court review *Dukes v. Wal-Mart*, a gender discrimination suit filed against the retail giant nine years ago. The original case began with assistant manager Stephanie Odle, who discovered three male assistant managers were given promotion tests while she was not and that a male co-worker in a similar position was earning \$23,000 a year more than she was. With more than one million women signed on, *Dukes* is easily the biggest employment discrimination case in U.S. history. Should it lose, Wal-Mart stands to owe more than \$1 billion in damages.

...In 1777 women lost the right to vote in NY. In 1780 women lost the right to vote in MA. In 1784 women lost the right to vote in NH. In 1807 women lost the right to vote in NJ. In 1887 women lost the right to vote in UT.

...Now only 16.8% of the 435 seats in the House of Representatives and 17% of the 100 Senate seats are held by women.

MOHEGANS INDUCT 1ST FEMALE CHIEF IN OVER 300 YEARS

HARTFORD, Conn. -- Connecticut's Mohegan tribe is inducting its first female tribal chief in almost 300 years.

In a ceremony, Lynn Malerba became chief of the Mohegans, whose Mohegan Sun casino complex in southeastern Connecticut is one of the world's largest gaming and hotel facilities and employs nearly 10,000 people.

Malerba is the Mohegans' first female chief since 1723.

The tribe, which has about 1,700 members, has been without a chief since the death in October 2007 of Ralph Sturges. He shepherded the tribe through federal recognition in 1994 and the opening of its casino two years later.

Malerba was formerly the chairwoman of the Mohegan Tribal Council, the governing body that runs the casino and the tribe's business interests.
