Why Women Quit Science

She Wanted to Do Her Research. He Wanted to Talk 'Feelings.'

The author describes her experience over 2 decades as a professor advising former women students. It is well worth a read - and a good discussion topic for us! Below are some quotes from the article:

"The absence of women within STEM programs is not only progressive, it is persistent — despite more than 20 years of programs intended to encourage the participation of girls and women. Plenty of explanations have been offered as to why women leave science, but the reason doesn't appear to be performance."

"In the rare case when a female scientist becomes a faculty member, she finds herself invested in the very system that is doing the weeding, and soon recognizes that sexual harassment is one of the sharpest tools in the

shed. My own experiences as a student, scientist and mentor lead me to believe that such harassment is widespread."

"Sexual harassment in science generally starts like this: A woman (she is a student, a technician, a professor) gets an email and notices that the subject line is a bit off: 'I need to tell you,' or 'my feelings.' " <u>Read the article</u> in the NYT here.

AAUW's Latest Research Report, Barriers and Bias: The Status of Women in Leadership

"Women have been leaders throughout history, and today the tradition of volunteer female leadership continues to flourish. Yet in terms of paid leadership, women's elevation to top positions is relatively rare."

"Women make up about 50 percent of the U.S. workforce but only 4 percent of chief executive officers at Standard & Poor's 500 index companies, 19 percent of S&P 500 board seats, and only about 26 percent of college and university presidents. In politics, women represent 19 percent of the U.S. Congress and a smaller fraction of governors...."
