

AAUW 2015 ACCOMPLISHMENTS/ADVOCACY ACHIEVEMENTS:

- 1. 250,000 emails sent to legislators by AAUW members.
- 2. AAUW Action Fund Capital Hill Lobbyists made 1300 visits to Senators and Representatives on issues important to women and families. 40 years of citizen lobbying.
- 3. US Dept of Education's Office for Civil Rights (advocated by AAUW) published official tools for Title IX coordinators. **Resource Delivery Project** meets with local communities and school districts to share new materials.
- 4. AAUW leaders advocated for civil rights and gender equity provisions that were included in federal K-12 education laws.
- 5. AAUW's Lisa Maatz testified to the House on the issue of sexual assaults on college campuses.
- 6. AAUW, along with other groups, gave US Dept of Justice guidance on identifying and preventing gender bias in response to sexual assault and domestic violence.
- 7. Released Fall edition of "The Simple Truth about the Gender Pay Gap".
- 8. Released "Solving the Equation" with recommendations for state and federal policy makers to increase women's participation in STEM fields.
- 9. Pres. Obama's paid leave executive order endorsed many AAUW priorities (i.e. Healthy Families Act, paid leave programs & plans at the state level).
- 10. US Dept. of Labor issued final rules prohibiting federal contractors from retaliating against employees who ask about or share salary information.
- 11. Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013: Final regulations went into effect 7/1/15 that require colleges and universities to take better steps to end sexual violence.
- 12. Included in the 2015 State of the Union address were many AAUW priorities: equal pay, expanding daycare tax credits, paid sick leave, making college more accessible & affordable, improving retirement savings, raising minimum wage, and making investments in education.

2016 GOALS:

- 1. Better policies on paid leave and higher minimum wage laws.
- 2. Improved federal overtime rules, better compensation data reporting to help close the gender gap.
- 3. High quality public education, access to birth control, equal pay.
- 4. AAUW Action Fund Capital Hill Lobby Corps will continue to address campus sexual assault, improve the climate for women in STEM, and open up more career and technical education options for girls.
- 5. 2016 "It's My Vote: I Will BE Heard" voter registration/get-out-the-vote campaign.
