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STEM group STEM Update: Envision the Future STEM Program

In July I spent a week at the Envision the Future STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) program at Bridgewater State University (BSU) with 48 Middle School girls from 17 different communities, 5 from Weymouth. It was an exciting and inspiring week for all who attended. Representative Joseph Kennedy and BSU President, Fred Clark welcomed the girls on Monday. Throughout the week the girls were busy with hands-on activities where they had the opportunity to learn and explore many different aspects of STEM. They designed and built underwater ROVs, solved crimes using DNA, learned about computer programming, and programmed Lego robots. In addition, they participated in a music and rhythm workshop, learned about urban design and transportation planning, relaxed with yoga, and solved environmental issues using biological solutions. During the Meet and Greet dinner on Thursday night, the girls had the opportunity to talk with several women professionals that work in STEM related fields. The week culminated with a STEM Resource Fair where the girls shared some of the highlights of what they learned and did all week. The AAUW-South Shore Branch also had a table display at the STEM Resource Fair.

Now the girls will return to their communities and work with their Community STEM Replication teams to host events and activities throughout the year that will encourage other young girls to get involved with STEM! I really enjoyed working with this group of girls, they were so excited about each activity, they got along well with each other and they never gave up. They inspired me and I know they will continue to do great things in the future. I will be working with the girls from Weymouth to help replicate some of the activities and to help

them continue to learn more about STEM careers and opportunities. If you'd like to join the Weymouth Community Replication Team please let me know.

How to Unleash Girls' Natural Potential in STEM

A Yale study published in the summer of 2013 (<u>click here</u>) showed that physicists, chemists and biologists were likely to view a young male scientist more favorably than a woman with the same qualifications. The number of female scientists is low. Only 14 percent of physics professors are women, and the numbers of black and Hispanic scientists are even fewer.

A recent experiment by Green Works found that STILL only one in every 1,000 girls becomes a scientist, and when girls were asked to draw scientists, they drew men!! The Unequal Fortunes of Professional Women Soccer Players

In light of the recent success of the US women's soccer team in their world cup, you might like to read how they compare to the men. Despite the improvements resulting from Title IX, there are still disparites in college soccer programs. At professional level, differences are stark. The minimum salary for athletes in the MLS, the

highest-level men's soccer league, is \$60,000 (up from \$36,500 in 2014), salaries in the women's equivalent, the NWSL, range from a paltry <u>\$6,842 to \$37,800</u> at the cap. Prize money for the winners of the women's tournament this year was set at \$2 million, up from \$1 million in 2011. In 2014, FIFA doled out <u>\$576 million in prize money</u> for the men's tournament, with a full \$35 million set aside for the winners... .<u>Read the AAUW story by clicking here.</u>

Report on the AAUW National Convention

Attending a national AAUW convention is always an exciting, inspiring and reaffirming experience. The convention in San Diego this past June was no different. We arrived on Wednesday evening in time to grab a bite to eat with AAUW friends from across the country. On Thursday we joined some Massachusetts convention attendees to do some sightseeing, stopping for lunch at the famous Del Coronado Hotel. At the opening dinner on Thursday evening we were elated to have AAUW Vice President of Government Relations Lisa Maatz and Lily Ledbetter, the Fair Pay Advocate, join our table. Needless to say, the conversation was stimulating.

On Friday morning, Catherine Lharmon, Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights, U.S. Department of Education, revved us up to continue our fight for women's rights. At Friday's lunch we listened to an impressive panel discuss women and girls in STEM. We heard a review on AAUW's latest research on the topic, celebrated the founding of Tech Trek and heard from industry leaders on what's happening right now in the workforce. Friday night was open for dinner so a group of eleven from MA headed out to dinner at Anthony's Fish Grotto. A fun highlight was returning to the hotel by racing pedi-cabs. Saturday started with a panel, What Does It Take To Make A Woman Leader? The panel tackled important questions related to women's paths to leadership, how women are treated once they become leaders, and how to empower women in our local communities. We spent the rest of day attending workshops and the AAUW Annual Meeting and Town Hall. We hardly had time to shop at Shop AAUW! Sheila concentrated on membership workshops and Hollie on programs. One of the highlights of the workshop, Creating Engaging,

After a cocktail reception on the Bay View Lawn overlooking the water, we attended the closing banquet honoring 2015 AAUW Achievement Awardee Maria Klawe, AAUW Alumnae Recognition Awardee Faith Ringgold, and Eleanor Roosevelt Fund Awardee Juanita Johnson-Bailey. We are always impressed with these outstanding women and their accomplishments.

Sunday's closing speaker was Juanita Johnson-Bailey, Director, Institute for Women's Studies, University of Georgia. Our farewell to San Diego included a harbor cruise and dinner with AAUW friends in the Gaslamp Quarter. We returned home exhausted but knowing AAUW is a great organization of articulate, intelligent women working extremely hard to break down the barriers facing women and girls—an organization to which we are proud to belong.
