BOOK GROUP

The Book Group will be reading and discussing <u>The Invention of Wings</u> by Sue Monk Kidd on May 19th at 7:00 pm at Carol Sullivan's home in Scituate. We hope you will join us for what we're sure will be a lively discussion.

The Invention of Wings, a powerful and sweeping historical novel by Sue Monk Kidd, begins, fittingly, with an image of flight: Hetty "Handful", who has grown up as a slave in early nineteenth century Charleston, recalls the night her mother told her that her ancestors in Africa could fly over trees and clouds. That day, Handful's mother, Charlotte, gave her daughter the gift of hope—the possibility that someday she might regain her wings and fly to freedom. Throughout Kidd's exquisitely written story, Handful struggles, sometimes with quiet dissidence, sometimes with open rebellion, to cultivate a belief in the invincibility of her spirit and in the sacred truth that one does not need actual wings in order to rise.

Barely a stone's throw from the slave quarters where Handful and her mother share a room behind the grand Grimké house, another young woman fights a different battle with the constraints of her society. Sarah Grimké is the middle daughter of a wealthy and prominent family at the pinnacle of Charleston's social hierarchy—the daughter her mother calls difficult and her father calls remarkable. From the time of her first violent childhood confrontation with slavery, Sarah is unable to abide the oppression and brutality of the slave system that surrounds her. Ambitious and keenly intelligent, she harbors an intense longing to have a voice in the world and to follow her father and brothers' footsteps to a profession in the law. Crushed by the strictures that her family and society impose on women, Sarah forges a tortuous, yet brave path toward abolition and women's rights—a crusade in which she will be joined by her fiery sister Angelina.

STEM Conference for Girls in Grades 5-8

Our branch's 2015 STEM conference at Weymouth High School offered 64 enthusiastic girls a chance to explore a great variety of STEM fields. Most of the girls came from Weymouth but there were also 8 out of town girls. The Conference started off with a motivational presentation by Dr. Elizabeth Matzkin, from Harvard Medical School's Department of Orthopaedic Surgery and Chief of Women's Sports Medicine. She had simple but powerful words of wisdom: 1) Be determined and don't look back; 2) Love what you do; and 3) Just gotta do it!.

Each girl then attended 3 workshops out of the 16 offered. What a varied set of choices they had — The Gills Club: Exposing Girls to Shark Science, Engineering Balloon Powered Race Cars, Household

Science, Materials and their Density, Dental Hygiene, Lego Robotics, Electricity!, Astronomy, Nursing, Robotics, Biology: Swamp River Check Up, No Bones About It!, Create with Code, Beyond the Code, Meteorology: Whither the Weather. In these hands-on workshops, the girls sawed "bones", listened to their heart beat, mucked around in mud to discover what creatures live there, worked with robots, studied the stars and learned about women astronomers. These are only a few examples of the great learning activities in which the girls participated.

The workshop presenters were a diverse group including STEM professionals, teachers, professors, undergraduate and graduate students, and even high school students. All were dedicated to getting girls excited about STEM and they succeeded.

The STEM conference would not have been possible without the help of many people and organizations.
