Past State President Launches First Novel

Gates Along My Path is historical fiction from a young adult point of view. It is set in mid-nineteenth century Worcester, Massachusetts during a period of reform in the United States. Just how does one go about choosing the right path to travel through life especially when you are under the age of twelve? Liza makes her life changing decision, but will it be the best choice?

Stepping down as Massachusetts state president in 1996, Karen Board Moran passionately pursued the history of the woman's rights movement. Her research and reenactments helped the Worcester Women's History Project raise awareness of the first National Woman's Rights Convention held in Worcester in 1850. AAUW recognized the convention's importance and helped fund Women 2000, the sesquicentennial celebration of the convention, with a community action grant.

Karen's personal goal was to encourage young adults to explore the past to better shape their future. She began writing *Gates Along My Path* to tell the story of growing up in the mid-19th century and the impact of the convention key principle of "equality before the law without distinction of sex or color" both then and in the reader's 21st century. No one walks away from this novel without being well aware of what remains to be done for human rights, for women's rights are human rights, 164 years later. *Gates Along My Path* is a perfect gift to share with young adults nine and older.

As a retiree now living in Tucson, Karen continues to celebrate women's history and uses AAUW speaking points in her Tucson portrayals of suffragist Clara Fish Roberts, a graduate of the University of Arizona who founded the Tucson Collegiate Club in 1909. Last summer Karen began a new pursuit of the suffragists in Door County, Wisconsin, her summer home, as she continues to raise awareness of women's history across the country.
