Christina Bain – Director of the Initiative on Human Trafficking and Modern Slavery: Christina Bain is the Director of Babson College's Initiative on Human Trafficking and Modern Slavery where she is focused on addressing the role of business and entrepreneurial solutions in the fight against human trafficking, in addition to coursework and initiatives to train the next generation of business leaders in anti-trafficking strategies. She is also an Affiliate of the Gender Violence Program at Harvard Law School where she is expanding her work on technology, human trafficking, and legal policy through launching trainings for U.S. state judges. Christina is the former and founding Director of the Program on Human Trafficking and Modern Slavery within the Carr Center for Human Rights Policy at the Harvard Kennedy School, a program that she designed, developed, and implemented through research, coursework, global online conferences, lectures, fellowships, and student internships and grants. Prior to the Harvard Kennedy School, Christina was appointed by Massachusetts Governor Mitt Romney as the Executive Director of the

Governor's Commission on Sexual and Domestic Violence, a statewide commission of over 340 public and private sector partners. She previously served as the Public Affairs Liaison to Massachusetts Lieutenant Governor Kerry Healey where she worked on domestic violence and criminal justice issues, including human trafficking and sex offender management. Christina also served as a Special Assistant to Governor Jane Swift of Massachusetts.

A TRIBUTE TO MARGARET RIDGE

Margaret Elizabeth Ridge, an AAUW Life Member and member of the North Shore Branch and the North Shore Area Branch passed away January 2, 2015, at the age of 95. For many years Marge served as Treasurer, North Shore Branch and she was a frequent participant and avid supporter of the North Shore Area Branch. While Marge raised her family in New Jersey, she had deep roots in this part of Massachusetts, where she and her family, both the generation before and the generation after, spent their summers in Es-



sex. Once retired, she and her husband Charlie built a beautiful home for themselves and relocated to Essex permanently. Details of her life are excerpted from her obituary, below.

"...Marge received her B.S. in Chemistry from The College of Wooster (Ohio), and her M.S. in Chemistry from Western Reserve University (Ohio). During World War II, she was a research chemist at Heyden Chemical Company in N.J. She married Charles Kennedy Ridge in, 1946 just after he returned from his Army tour of duty in Asia. In Verona and Upper Montclair, NJ, they raised four children, Betsy, Martha, Bill, and Sarah. She was employed as the treasurer of Electro-Lift, Inc., a design and sales firm for custom built hoists, until retiring to Essex in 1989. Margaret was passionate about making college opportunities available to deserving young women. For decades she headed the annual College Women's Club of Montclair book sale which has raised over a million dollars for scholarships..."
