April 9, Tuesday, 7 pm HONDURAS HOPE: The Strength and Resiliency of a Central American Community Speakers: Peter and Kathy Swanson Hingham Public Library 66 Leavitt St. (off Rt. 228) Whiton Room



Everyone reads and hears about the plight of desperate immigrants who leave their Central American countries to flee violence and poverty. But what of the people who chose to remain? What is their story, and why do they stay? Learn about the efforts of Honduras Hope, an organization based in Franconia, New Hampshire that has been working since 2002 to build healthy, safe, sustainable communities in Yoro, Honduras.

Pine needle baskets will be available for purchase (price range \$16-\$20). The indigenous women of Plan Grande (a reservation) in Yoro, Honduras make the baskets. Honduras Hope pays fair market value directly to the women. All profits/proceeds go to Honduras Hope to fund educational and nutritional programs for the children of the community.

A Victory for Equal Pay

"Court ruling requires companies to report pay data by gender, race

Closing the gender wage gap will take work on many fronts, but one key tool is having more information about salaries. Removing the shroud of secrecy about who earns what is a critical step towards ensuring equal pay for equal work.

The latest sign of progress on this front: A ruling by a federal district court judge in D.C. that said the government acted illegally when it stopped the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) from collecting pay data by gender, race and ethnicity from large companies. Tanya S. Chutkan, a U.S. district judge for the District of Columbia, ordered the government to move forward with a requirement that large employers confidentially provide pay data to EEOC by May 2019."
