Compressor Station adjacent to the new Fore River Bridge in North Weymouth, which will adversely affect South Shore residents. "This Compressor Station poses a serious threat to the **health, safety, environment, and economy** of the South Shore." (nocompressor.com)

NCCWSL MEETING AT CURRY COLLEGE

AAUW meeting at Curry College, 15 October 2019, 6:30 pm

The meeting was in the faculty room and we were greeted by Amanda Kennedy who welcomed us and invited us to have some food at the buffet they had set up. We were soon joined by six

students including one of the participants in this year's National Conference for College Women Student Leaders, Sarah Simmons. The other participant, Coddell Tuning, was not present.

Ginny Giordano spoke about our efforts to increase opportunities for AAUW to collaborate with students. She recommended that they become familiar with AAUW and the information and opportunities we could provide that could help them now and when they enter higher education and/or the work force later. Ginny also left literature for the young women, and they thanked her for that.

Sarah Simmons gave a report of her experiences at the recent conference, illustrated by a Power Point presentation. For four days in Maryland she was very busy with many activities, both meetings and social events, that both interested and inspired her.



She attended sessions on such subjects as “Building relationships in a diverse society,” “Leadership,” “Grad school and beyond,” “Creating and sustaining change,” “Revolutionary power of women’s anger,” “Activists and troublemakers,” “Title IX – what can you do?” and “Are you feeling burned out?” She also had a tour of DC, and heard speeches by Tererai Trent, author of *The Awakened Woman* and keynote speaker Roxanne Gay, author of *Bad Feminist*. Two Women of Distinction shared stories and stayed after their talks to socialize with the student attendees. She was also pleased to have a chance to meet Kimberly Churches of the National AAUW.

Sarah said she learned many things during her attendance at the conference, including to think of change as a process, to learn to network, to take time to focus on you, and that burnout is real. We all learned that this is a fine group of young women and the support of the conference is a valuable activity.

We introduced ourselves all around and stood for pictures with the students, then drove home under a full moon.

AAUW Reacts to EEOC Announcement on Pay Data Collection

September 11, 2019

Kim Churches, CEO of the American Association of University Women, issued this statement in response to the announcement by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) of its intent to stop collecting pay data from employers after meeting the court-ordered requirement that it do so this year.

“It is enormously disappointing, but sadly unsurprising, to learn the EEOC plans to stop collecting data that could help shed light on pay discrimination. Coming on the heels of yesterday’s U.S. Census data report showing the gender pay gap remains unchanged, this calls into question the Trump Administration’s commitment to pay equity for women — as well as to the economic security for American families. We need to do more, not less, to close the gender pay gap, and this data collection was a significant step in the right direction. AAUW will be watching the EEOC to see that the data currently required gets properly collected and sufficiently analyzed. And we will do everything we can to try to reverse this action to ensure the EEOC stays true to its mission of creating a fair and equitable workplace for all.”


