PUBLIC POLICY

AAUW's 2020 Gender Policy Agenda

In January, 2020, AAUW announced its gender policy agenda outlining priority issues for the 2020 election season. As a non-partisan organization, AAUW does not endorse specific candidates but advocates for policies that improve the lives of girls, women and their families. Here's what AAUW would like to see implemented to advance gender equality in education and the workplace.

Among the priority issues is one that is particularly relevant given the circumstances of current pandemic – **Implement Paid Leave and Paid Sick Days**

"Unlike the majority of developed countries worldwide, the U.S. does not guarantee paid time off for illness, family care or parental leave. Offering such paid time off would improve worker performance, benefiting employees, employers, and the economy.

Elected officials must adopt policies to give workers paid time off for illness and care giving:

- Federal: pass the Family and Medical Insurance Leave (FAMILY) Act and the Healthy Families Act.
- State and local: states should establish paid leave programs or insurance laws for illness and care giving. Governors can enact policies providing protections to state workers if the legislature will not act. Municipalities should pass legislation providing protections to municipal workers if the state will not act."
