AAUW's Delivers an Excellent Webinar "2020 Election Voter Access and Education During the COVID-19 Pandemic"

[PM: I've summarized below the key elements of what we need to know, think about, and do to support safe and secure voting in 2020.]

Absentee Ballot vs Vote-by-Mail

Absentee voting: where a voter requests a ballot be sent – traditionally an excuse/reason is required

• 17 states still require justification for absentee voting

No-excuse absentee voting: no justification necessary

33 states and DC have No-excuse absentee voting

Vote-by-mail [VBM]: the automatic process of sending all voters ballots

• 5 states practice VBM. Generally polling places are still open

All-mail: states which eliminated in-person voting and now have voting by mail only

Hawaii, Alaska, and Wyoming

Key challenges are: correct mailing addresses and internet access for voters.

Make a Phone Call to States

Call:

Secretary of State Board of Elections Governor

Remind them, if it's the case, that you are a CONSTITUENT.

Plan a script such as:

I'm calling to find out how the next election will be conducted. As a constituent, I am concerned that these elections will be conducted safely and accessibly. What is our state doing about voter access during the public health crisis?

KNOW YOUR STATE-SPECIFIC INFORMATION.

Currently, for Massachusetts, the Secretary of State's website says:

Under the Massachusetts Constitution, absentee ballots are available for all elections to voters who are disabled, out of town on Election Day, or have a religious belief preventing them from voting at their polling place.

A new law has been passed clarifying that any person taking precaution related to COVID-19 in response to a declared state of emergency or from guidance from a medical professional, local or state health official, or any civil authority shall be deemed to be unable by reason of physical disability to cast their vote in person at a polling location.

It is the opinion of this office that you qualify for an absentee ballot due to physical disability if:

- You are ill;
- You are confined to your home because you may transmit infection; or
- You cannot leave your home because you are a member of a population vulnerable to illness;

• You are staying in your home or avoiding your polling place as a precautionary measure in response to COVID-19.

Here is the link to the MA Secretary of State's info. Please check for updates.

Consider whether – in the case of our state of Massachusetts – we think this change is sufficient. Perhaps you'd like to promote vote-by-mail VBM where all voters are automatically sent ballots or even All-Mail where voting is by mail only.

The Importance of GOTV [Get Out the Vote]

VOTER REGISTRATION

Register and motivate voters

Targeted and personal connections work best – and in the past in-person methods were prioritized: eg., door-to-door, tables at markets, as well as phone calls, social media etc.

NOW we can still:

- phone or text bank and we can do it together virtually
- do postcard and letter campaigns and help the Post Office out, too!
- conduct social media activities....

When communicating with prospective voters:

- Find out if they're registered and show them how to find out [Here is link for Am I REGISTERED TO VOTE in Massachusetts?]
- Make sure they know where their polling place is and ensure they know how to get there
- Try to get them to commit to voting on the day (activists swear by the efficacy of getting a commitment)

Efforts to GET OUT THE VOTE are more important this year than ever!!!!!

AAUW has prepared a 2020 Voter Issue Guide which will be on the website soon.

I will follow up with more information in the coming weeks.

If you don't remember your Membership ID or password, it will get you there. I suggest once you have your ID# and password you select keep me signed in. It is much easier than having to find your membership ID every time. Once you are logged in, click on the box Enter Member Services Database. Once in the MSD, you will see your contact information. On the left-hand side there is a link Renew My Membership. It is personalized just for you. Don't let the length of these directions scare you. If you follow them, you will see how easy it is to pay your dues online.
