AAUW Urges Congress to Enact Universal Paid Leave in Build Back Better Package

September 9, 2021

AAUW joined dozens of organizations to lobby congress on behalf of the tens of millions of working families they represent. They urged Congress to enact a universal, comprehensive paid leave policy as part

of the Build Back Better package. They especially asked members of Congress to support House Ways & Means Committee Chairman Richard Neal's paid family and medical leave plan in the Build Back Better Act. The letter sent to Congress says, "...This plan, which builds off of the FAMILY Act, would create a national, universal, and comprehensive paid family and medical leave program to help ensure that people who work can take the time they need to address serious health and caregiving needs. It would help support working families' economic security, promote racial and gender equity, create a more level playing field for businesses of all sizes and strengthen our economy. This is the national paid family and medical leave plan voters want and our country needs."

An Act to End Child Marriage in Massachusetts

Many of us might not be aware that child marriage is not only a serious problem nationwide, but it is also an issue in Massachusetts – Nearly 300,000 minors were married between 2000 and 2018 in the US according to a 2018 study. (Child Marriage—_Shocking Statistics, UNCHAINED AT LAST http://www.unchainedatlast.org/child-marriage-shocking-statistics/).

An Act to end child marriage in Massachusetts, sponsored by Representative Kay Khan and Senator Harriette Chandler, would keep the marriage age at 18 and eliminate the dangerous loophole allowing marriage before 18 with parental "consent" and judicial approval.


Although the marriage age in Massachusetts is 18, a loophole allows children of any age to marry with the approval of a judge and parent consent. Between 2000 and 2018, courts in Massachusetts approved the marriages of almost 60 children under the age of 16 – and too young to consent to sex. [Based on marriage

license data from Massachusetts Registry of Vital Records and Statistics, retrieved by Unchained and analyzed by Dr. Alissa Koski and her graduate students at McGill University in Montreal ...and... M.G.L. c. 265 § \$ 22A, 23; *Glover v. Callahan*, 12 N.E.2d 194, 196 (Mass. 1937)].
