



# Book Discussion Sons of Fez, with author Kay Hardy Campbell

## January 11, 7 pm via Zoom



Devoting the January branch meeting to a group book discussion is a tradition we will continue to follow this year. Some years we are lucky enough to have the author of the book we have read join us. This January we are doubly blessed as we will have author Kay Hardy Campbell join us for the second time. Kay, former member of the

South Shore Area branch before she moved to Maine to pursue writing full time, paid us a visit when we read her debut novel, *A Caravan of Brides*. Kay will join us again on Tuesday, January 11 via Zoom as we discuss her book, *Sons of Fez: A Moroccan Time Travel Adventure*. Although everyone is welcome to attend the meeting, the discussion with Kay will be much more meaningful if you have read the book. There is still time to get it read.

Here is a brief summary: Moroccan tour guide Ibrahim brings a busload of students from a summer Arabic program to stay in the medina (old city) of Fez, right next to a newly-opened time portal. When a student goes missing, Ibrahim looks for him and slips into the past, and they find themselves in a fight

to save the city. Along the way, they come face to face with the mysteries of the medina, where history lives around every corner.

Kay Hardy Campbell was born in Abington, Pennsylvania, and grew up in Massachusetts and Minnesota. She developed a lifelong fascination for the Middle East, and earned a BA in Arabic and Middle Eastern



Studies from the University of Minnesota and a Master's Degree from Harvard in Middle Eastern Studies. She lived in Saudi Arabia for several years with her American husband, a fellow student of Arabic. While living in the kingdom, she wrote cultural features for the English language dailies, Arab News and Saudi Gazette. Since returning to the U.S., she has traveled back to Saudi Arabia three times on assignment for Aramco World Magazine to write about Saudi culture. While visiting Morocco for the first time in 2005, she fell instantly in love with the medina (old city) of Fez, the setting for her second novel, *The Sons of Fez: A Moroccan Time Travel Adventure*.

We look forward to seeing you and Kay via Zoom on January 11<sup>th</sup> at 7 pm.

## Public Policy

#### **National**

Have a look at AAUW National discussion: "Where We Stand: Reproductive Rights"

"AAUW supports choice in determining one's reproductive life and increased access to health care and family planning services."

"AAUW will keep fighting to improve access to care by working with Congress and federal agencies to take the following actions:

- 1. Pass the Women's Health Protection Act (H.R. 3755/S. 1975). This bill will address the ceaseless attacks on reproductive rights by finally codifying the rights of pregnant people to access, and health care professionals to provide, abortion care. Read more about this legislation and tell your members of Congress to support here.
- 2. Improve public funding for reproductive health.
- 3. Put prevention first.
- 4. Ensure access to legally prescribed or available contraception."

#### **Massachusetts**

AAUW-MA collaborated with the Massachusetts Caucus of Women Legislators and the Massachusetts Commission on the Status of Women to support recent bills before the State Legislature such as:

- An Act Supporting Parents Running for Office (S.475 and H.769)
- An Act Relative to Wage Transparency (S.475 and H.769)

There are two other important bills that we are following:

- An Act providing affordable and accessible high quality early education and care to promote child development and well-being and support the economy. Otherwise known as the Common Start Bill. (S.362 and H.605)
- An act to end child marriage in Massachusetts. (S.937 and H.1709)
