Working to Support Reproductive Rights

On June 24, 2022, the US Supreme Court overturned Roe v. Wade. Although Massachusetts had previously passed the Roe Act protecting the state's citizens, 26 states are certain or likely to ban Abortion bans most severely impact people in marginalized groups who already struggle to access health care, including abortion.

Book Discussion




The branch book discussion group meets monthly from September-August on the 3rd Tuesday of the month at 6:30 pm.
